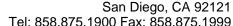
### GRIN2A Antibody (C-term) Blocking peptide - Protein Information

Name GRIN2A

Synonyms NMDAR2A

#### **Function**

Component of NMDA receptor complexes that function as heterotetrameric, ligand-gated ion channels with high calcium permeability and voltage-dependent sensitivity to magnesium. Channel activation requires binding of the neurotransmitter glutamate to the epsilon subunit, glycine binding to the zeta subunit, plus membrane depolarization to eliminate channel inhibition by Mg(2+) (PubMed:<a href="http://www.uniprot.org/citations/8768735" target="\_blank">8768735</a>, PubMed:<a href="http://www.uniprot.org/citations/26919761" target="\_blank">26919761</a>, PubMed:<a href="http://www.uniprot.org/citations/26875626" target="\_blank">26875626</a>, PubMed:<a href="http://www.uniprot.org/citations/28105280" target="\_blank">28105280</a>, PubMed:<a href="http://www.uniprot.org/citations/28105280" target="\_blank">28105280</a>). Sensitivity to glutamate and channel kinetics depend on the subunit composition; channels containing GRIN1 and GRIN2A have lower sensitivity to glutamate and faster deactivation kinetics than channels formed by GRIN1 and GRIN2B (PubMed:<a href="http://www.uniprot.org/citations/26919761" target="\_blank">26919761</a>, PubMed:<a href="http://www.uniprot.org/citations/26875626" target="\_blank">26875626</a>). Contributes to the slow phase of excitatory postsynaptic current, long- term synaptic potentiation, and learning (By similarity).

#### GRIN2A Antibody (C-term) Blocking peptide - Background

N-methyl-D-aspartate (NMDA) receptors are a class ofionotropic glutamate-gated ion channels. These receptors have beenshown to be involved in long-term potentiation, anactivity-dependent increase in the efficiency of synaptictransmission thought to underlie certain kinds of memory andlearning. NMDA receptor channels are heteromers composed of the keyreceptor subunit NMDAR1 (GRIN1) and 1 or more of the 4 NMDAR2subunits: NMDAR2A (GRIN2A), NMDAR2B (GRIN2B), NMDAR2C (GRIN2C) and NMDAR2D (GRIN2D). Alternatively spliced transcript variantsencoding different isoforms have been found for this gene.
